The Trustees of ACE Africa (UK) present their report on activities for the year ended 31st December, 2010.

The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" 2005 in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the Charity which also comply with the requirements of the Charity's constitution and applicable law. The Trustees have complied with the duty in section 4 of the 2006 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission.

#### Constitution

ACE Africa (UK) was originally constituted under a Memorandum of Association signed on 10th March 2003 and altered by resolutions dated 13 June 2005, 31 August 2005 and 26 January 2009 and was incorporated on 8th April, 2003 as ACE UK. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

### **Trustees**

Trustees are appointed by members in an Annual General Meeting. The trustees may appoint new trustees to serve until the next Annual General Meeting. All trustees retire at the conclusion of each Annual General Meeting unless re-appointed or deemed to have been re-appointed. There may be no less than three Trustees. There are eight trustees at present.

The Board appointed Peter Lever as a trustee from 19th January, 2010 and Mr Mark Chamberlen from 5th November, 2010. On 15 November, 2010 Tabitha Elwes, who was chairman from 2004 to 2007, retired from the board. Mike Hammond was appointed as a trustee from 7th March, 2011.

In selecting trustees consideration is given to the overall breadth of knowledge required of the board of Trustees. Trustees who are appointed already have knowledge of their profession or their industries so do not require any technical training. However new Trustees receive the appropriate training documentation about becoming a Trustee and are given an induction by an existing Trustee.

### **Organisational Structure**

The trustees oversee the affairs of the Charity on a voluntary basis, meeting as necessary for this purpose and have appointed from among their number a chairman, a treasurer and a secretary. Decisions are made by majority vote at meetings of trustees. We employ a full-time Director, Samantha Kite, to manage ACE Africa (UK)'s fundraising, communications and administrative activities. The Director is supported by a finance and administration assistant and temporary administrative volunteers. Samantha Kite took over from Juliet Cockram who had been our director for 18 months and who left ACE Africa in July 2010 to take a new position. The trustees thank Juliet for all she did in her time with ACE Africa to take our capabilities and activities to a new scale and sophistication. For the past three year ACE Africa (UK has occupied offices made available free by Value Partners Group. We are extremely grateful to Value Partners for their generosity and unfailing hospitality during this period. From March 2011 ACEAfrica (UK) has moved its operations to offices provided free by the Lockton Compnaies LLP and we thank them most sincerely for their valuable support of our work in this way.

### **Principal Activities**

To promote the efficiency and effectiveness of charities and non-government organisations (NGOs), community based organisations, voluntary bodies, other associations, institutions and statutory authorities undertaking charitable activities in Africa in particular that would be recognised as such under English law (including the provision of financial and other support as the trustees see fit). ACE Africa 's aim is to reduce the impact of HIV/AIDS on rural communities so that such communities, parents, guardians and other carers have the knowledge, skills and resources to protect and care for orphans and vulnerable children, and to provide them with the opportunity to develop to their full potential.

ACE Africa recognises that effective community capacity building to achieve these goals is a long-term undertaking in each area of operation, and one which aims to reduce reliance of the host community on the NGO. ACE Africa will therefore provide support appropriate to the degree of self reliance achieved by each community with which it works. ACE Africa (UK) provides technical support and funds to implement these activities.

### **Connected Organisations**

ACE Africa (UK) is an independent charity.

### Operations Supported by ACE Africa (UK)

ACE Africa (UK) has been active since late 2005 through the work of its trustees and supporters. The Charity supports the work of registered NGOs, ACE Africa (Kenya) and ACE Africa (Tanzania).

ACE Africa (Kenya) has operated in Bungoma, Western Kenya for over seven years, where activities are now entering the last three-year phase of our ten-year community based orphan-care programme. In the nearby Siaya District of Nyanza, Western Kenya operations are in the second, four-year phase. ACE Africa (Tanzania) operates a programme similar to the Siaya operations, in the Arusha region, Arumeru District of Tanzania, launched in 2008 and currently in the first stage of development.

ACE Africa's programme addresses everything from immediate needs within vulnerable households, such as nutritional supplements, bedding, shelter and school fees; to family and individual counselling, promotion of child rights and child health, community food security, nutrition and training in income-generating activities for households and community support groups. We empower community members to be the agents of change; we help them to help each other.

ACE Africa (UK) raises funds in order to make grants to ACE Africa (Kenya) and ACE Africa (Tanzania). The Charity also provides technical and managerial support, and promotes and communicates on their behalf in the UK. ACE Africa (UK) will support other NGOs working in the same field alongside ACE Africa in Kenya and Tanzania.

ACE Africa (UK) appeals for grants from trusts, foundations, companies and similar institutions, and raises funds from individuals by direct approaches and by holding fund raising events. Included among funds raised are grants from individuals, trusts and schools to sponsor individual orphans through their secondary education. This is a discrete programme funded separately from the community support programmes.

### Future plans of the charity

The charity intends to continue its support of ACE Africa (Kenya) and ACE Africa (Tanzania). These two organisations intend to continue their respective community programmes to mitigate the effects of HIV/AIDS on communities in the areas where they operate with an emphasis on orphans and vulnerable children and people living with HIV/AIDS. The programme in Bungoma is at an advanced stage but has some three years to run as we gradually pass responsibilities to community organisations. In Siaya and Tanzania we will continue working with communities to strengthen their capacity to care for the orphans and vulnerable children in their midst. We are developing our capacity to transfer knowhow in the fields in which we work to other organisations working in different geographic areas, such as international and local NGOs and local community organisations.

### Activities in the UK

Grant income in 2010 came primarily from continuing support and follow-on grants from a number of our established institutional, trust, corporate and other donors of restricted funds. New donors included The Allan & Nesta Fergusson Charitable Trust and The Bulldog Trust. Our major grant from Comic Relief for the Bungoma programme entered its final year, as work moved into its three-year hand-over phase. On the unrestricted front donations were a little lower, in a difficult environment for raising such funds, but by dint of an expanded programme of challenges and events net income from events increased. An initiative through the See The Difference online media project started to generate funds for a campaign to treat liggers parasitic infection in our Bungoma operating areas.

Our director, Samantha Kite, joined an expedition to climb Mt Kilimanjaro, following in the footsteps of her predecessor Juliet Cockram, who led a similar expedition in 2009. As Juliet had, so Samantha reached the summit and raised over £8,000 for ACE by doing so! The Dwyer family continued raising funds for ACE in memory of their late daughter Rosie and 2010 saw the start of craft teaching funded by the Rosie Dwyer Fund at South End Primary School which ACE Africa supports in Bungoma. The ACE Truck Group raised a further £10,000 in 2010 and was able to finance the purchase of a vehicle for Bungoma early in 2010. A first cycle expedition was organised over 600km around Western Kenya and raised almost £10,000 net of all expenses. An innovative quiz and dinner, the "ACE of Trumps", was organised in November and succeeded in raising £53,000. A number of other smaller initiatives were organised by the director and trustees.

The ACE Secondary School Bursary Scheme continued at a similar level to 2009. Income during 2010 was over £51,000. A total of 83 children have now completed their secondary education supported by this scheme, 43 of them in 2010. ACE works with all the bursary holders when they leave school to provide community work and teaching experience in the gap year before any further education can commence and to plan the next steps in their careers. Of the 41 who had left school by the end of 2009 5 are now at university, a further 10 have places at university when they can find funding and over 20 have been offered places for further education or training. Bursaries were secured for 26 children to start their secondary schooling in 2010. An Alumni Fund has been established with the support of sponsors of bursaries to meet the costs of career counselling, computer training, community work and teaching experience, and of school leavers seeking places for vocational training, tertiary education and/or employment.

### **Grant making policy**

ACE Africa (UK) makes grants to ACE Africa in Kenya and Tanzania for specific components of their activities and in support of the implementation of their total strategy. In the first case reports are received on the relevant component of activities. In the second, reports will be received of overall progress towards each year's budget and plan.

### Financial Performance

Income during 2010 amounted to £563,453 (2009: £604,949) and expenditure amounted to £588,335 (2009: £507,312) of which £450,606 (2009: £378,332) was grant making, leaving a net expenditure of £24,881 (2009: income of £97,637). Donated income was £432,624 (2009: £482,905), and event income was £130,549 (2009: £121,405). Event expenses were £38,426 (2009: £40,939) leaving a surplus on events of £92,123 (2009: £80,466). The expenses of ACE Africa (UK) comprise consulting and supervision of operations in Africa of £5,572 (2009: £12,920), with executive management of operations now centred in Bungoma, and UK administrative and fundraising costs which amounted to £20,906 and £72,825 respectively (2009: £16,955 and £58,166). The total fundraising and administrative costs of £93,731 amounted to 18% of the total donated income and surplus on events (2009:13.3%). Of the donated income £320,259 (2009: £357,456) was restricted and £112,365 (2009: £125,449) unrestricted.

The interest income, unrestricted income and surplus on events, totalling £204,768 (2009: £206,554) less supervision, fundraising and administrative expenses totalling £99,303 (2009: £88,041), left an unrestricted surplus of £105,465 (2009: £118,513) before grants.

ACE Africa (UK) has made grants to ACE Africa during the year totalling £450,606 (2009: £378,332), of which £378,906 (2009: £284,314) was for restricted purposes and £71,700 (2009: £94,018) comprised unrestricted grants.

After making grants there was a surplus for the year in unrestricted funds of £33,765 (2009: £24,495) and a deficit of £58,647 in restricted funds (2009: surplus £73,142). Including balances brought forward from 2009, retained income at 31st December 2010 consisted of £66,232 (2009: £32,467) of unrestricted and £133,243 (2009: £191,890) of restricted funds. In the ACE Secondary Schooling Bursary Scheme monies were received in 2010 or previously in respect of sponsorships in 2011 and subsequently. These receipts, amounting to £43,100 (2009: £53,200) have been carried forward as deferred income.

Overall, the trustees expect the income of ACE Africa (UK) in 2011 to be broadly similar to the level reached in 2010. The continuing programme of fund raising activities planned for 2011, together with established streams of unrestricted income, will fund the costs of operating ACE Africa (UK) at a similar level to 2010 and of supporting ACE Africa in Kenya and Tanzania.

The trustees consider the balance of unrestricted funds carried forward, of £66,233, to be sufficient to ensure continuity of activities, amounting to over six months of expenditure of resources in the UK or over three months of total expenditure of unrestricted funds in the UK and Africa combined. The movement in restricted funds on hand from year to year reflects only timing differences in the receipt by the charity of grant income from donors and the making of grants to ACE Africa (Kenya) and ACE Africa (Tanzania) as required by progress of work in the field.

### **Accounting Policies**

A summary of the principal accounting policies is set out in Note 1 to the accounts on page 10.

### Risk

At present there are no risks connected with the internal management and administration of the charity beyond those of staff infidelity which are managed by supervision of income and accounting functions. ACE Africa (UK) makes grants to ACE Africa which gives rise to risks of misappropriation or maladministration of such grants. These risks are managed by regular monitoring of ACE Africa financial reports and activity reports, including the receipt of six-monthly audited financial reports, and by occasional visits to ACE Africa and its project areas by ACE Africa (UK) trustees and management.

### Responsibilities of the Board of Trustees

The trustees (who are also directors of ACE Africa (UK) for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires that the board of trustees prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;

Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;

Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

State whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and

Prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue in business.

The board of trustees is responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The board of management is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

### **Public benefit**

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

The Trustees have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Charity's aims and objectives and in planning the Charity's future activities. In particular, the Trustees have considered how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

### Trustees' declaration

So far as the Trustees are aware, there is no relevant information (as defined by Section 418 of the Companies Act 2006) of which the company's auditor is unaware, and each Trustee has taken all the steps that he ought to have taken as a Trustee in order to make himself aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the company's auditor is aware of that information.

### **Auditor**

Following the merger of Robson Taylor and Baker Tilly, which occurred on 1 May 2010, Baker Tilly UK Audit LLP became the company's auditor. Baker Tilly have indicated their willingness to continue in office, and a resolution for their reappointment will be submitted to the annual general meeting.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting Charities (issued in March 2005) and in accordance with the special provisions of Part 15 of the Companies Act relating to small entities.

### 1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the preceding year.

### a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005 and the FRSSE (effective April 2008).

### b) Fund accounting

- Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in the furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.
- Restricted funds are subject to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the fund provider.

### c) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations, sponsorships and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of specific performance by the charity, are recognized when the charity becomes entitled to the grant. Sponsorship income is deferred over the period to which the sponsorship relates (4 years).
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified.
   The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
- Investment income is included when receivable.

### d) Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as liabilities are incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Grants payable comprises of amounts paid to the institutions within Africa that deliver the services for the beneficiaries. These costs are recognised when paid or if ealier, when a constructive obligation to make the grant arises. These are indicated on the SOFA.
- Costs of generating funds include those costs incurred which relate to fundraising or organisation of events.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked with the strategic management of the charity.
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SOFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly; others are apportioned as set out in note 11.

### e) Grant making policy

The charity's grant making policy is outlined in the Trustees' Report.
